Creekcare helps landowners improve streamside areas. The Creekcare program is available to landowners on Johnson Creek, Sunshine Creek, Badger Creek and their tributaries. It is a free and voluntary program with the Johnson Creek Watershed Council and the Clackamas Soil and Water Conservation District.



#### Creekcare will commit to:

- Removing and controlling invasive weeds
- Planting beneficial native trees and shrubs that are easy to manage
- Maintaining the streamside area for up to five years
- Providing professional restoration crews to conduct all work
- Providing a free and voluntary service

#### hat is a healthy riparian area?

A riparian area is the established vegetation adjacent to a stream or creek. A healthy riparian area consists of a variety of native trees, shrubs, and is free of invasive, non-native plants like Himalayan blackberry, Reed Canary grass and Scots broom. A healthy riparian area functions as a filter for pollutants such as pesticides, animal waste, and sediment.
