About the District

We are a service organization. The Clackamas County Soil and Water Conservation District is a special service district headquartered in Oregon City, Oregon, governed by publicly elected directors and employing professional staff to serve our citizens. We provide service throughout Clackamas County, Oregon.

We see a future where people and places thrive. Our District is a place where our communities, environments, and economy thrive together.

Our mission is to help create that future. We provide technical service and support designed to conserve and use resources sustainably today and for future generations.

Our values guide us as we work toward accomplishing our mission.

- We strive to maximize community, environmental, and economic benefits through our projects and programs.
- We are accountable to our voters, taxpayers, and residents, and we measure the impacts of what we do.
- Our technical assistance to landowners is based on science and decades of proven technology.
- We leverage District resources through outside funding and form strategic partnerships to accomplish our work.
- We work as members of a flexible and responsive team, and treat everyone with respect.
- We support continuous learning and professional development.
- We reduce, reuse, recycle, and restore our natural resources.

An elected Board of Directors provides governance and accountability. The Clackamas County Soil and Water Conservation District is governed by a seven-member Board of Directors. Our Directors are locally elected and serve four-

year terms. The purposes and functions of a soil and water conservation district are described in Oregon Revised Statutes Chapter 568.

Our professional staff provides high quality service and accomplishment. Staff specialists provide a wide range of services and knowledge to our citizens. Conservation specialties including farm planning, streambank restoration, and invasive weeds are well represented on our staff. We provide many workshops throughout the year to help our citizens learn and do more conservation of our natural resources. Our management and administrative employees assure compliance with the many regulations and procedures we use to protect the resources entrusted to us.

We assist individuals, neighborhoods, and watersheds. Traditionally, we work one-on-one with individuals who are concerned with their land and related resources. Natural resource issues like soil erosion and water quality are rarely limited to a single land parcel. Instead, they may involve neighbors, neighborhoods, local landscapes, and sometimes extend to entire watersheds. By working together, we can achieve better solutions.

Our services are based on voluntary cooperation, not regulation. We do not issue tickets or turn people in. While we often act as an interface between a landowner and a regulatory agency, we will do so only at the request of the landowner. Our services and resources are available to people who are willing to collaborate with us to find appropriate solutions.

We provide services without discrimination. The Clackamas County Soil and Water Conservation District prohibits discrimination in its programs on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation, and marital or familial status. The District is an equal opportunity employer.

About this Plan

This plan is a guide. This annual work plan is organized into three-month periods representing calendar quarters. A plan is only a guide, and the very nature of the District's work requires that we remain nimble and flexible in order to meet the emerging needs of citizens and natural resources.

Each Quarterly period is represented by a table divided into eight columns: focus, task or activity, who is responsible for making sure the task gets done correctly and on time, due date for completion, and Quarterly columns for reporting the status of this work.

Because this is a plan, it is dynamic in nature. We update it regularly as resource conditions and natural events provide new opportunities to conserve our vital natural resources.

Our planned work addresses many important conservation needs. The District focuses our available time, money, and energy on a variety of important conservation issues, and on the sound operation of the District. Our programs, projects, and progress revolve around these focal points:

- Water quality Protecting and restoring the quality of surface and ground water.
- Water quantity Assuring future supplies of water for people, plants, and animals.
- Watersheds Working toward stronger, more resilient watershed conditions.
- Weather Developing responses to our changing climate, as well as floods and droughts.
- Weeds Detecting, controlling, and eradicating invasive plants.
- Wildlife Developing habitat conditions to enhance living conditions for wild creatures.
- Wildlands Working to improve wildlands, including prairies and forests.
- Working lands Providing service to help keep agricultural lands productive.
- Workshops, outreach, and education Reaching and teaching citizens, agencies, and organizations.
- Working together Developing and nurturing key partnerships to help achieve our conservation mission.
- Workplace Assuring accountability and sound delivery of services to our citizens.

We provide a number of funding assistance opportunities. Our conservationists look at natural resource issues and customer needs, and our financial staff provide the funding strategies that support installing time-tested, science-based conservation solutions.

- "Dollars on the Ground" is a traditional 75:25 cost-sharing program in which the District can pay up to 75% of the cost of implementing conservation practices, with the landowner picking up the remaining 25%.
- "Grant and Loan" is also a 75:25 program but the 25% consists of a low-interest loan to the landowner, with repayment over up to 10 years.
- "District Led Work" is generally used for projects involving public entities or those with predominantly public benefits.
- "Targeted Weed Grants" can pay up to 100%, up to \$2,500, for the actual cost of eradicating weeds on our Targeted Top Ten list.
- "Water Quality Small Grants" can pay up to 100%, up to \$2,500, for the actual cost of installing individual practices that improve or protect water quality.
- "Design and Consultation Small Grants" can pay up to 100%, up to \$2,500, for the actual cost of designing practices that will be implemented to improve or protect water quality. This program can also be used for cultural resources assessments as part of a water quality improvement or protection project.
- "Water Quality/Quantity Loans" is a low-interest loan program in which we can lend up to 100% of the actual cost of
 installing certain practices that improve or protect water quality.
